a. Addendum A: President's Remarks: Board of Trustees Meeting - October 11, 2022

Since I last spoke with you, I have talked to many people about adjunct equity. The focus of many of these conversations has been about the need to make Spartan Food Pantry accessible to the entire ECC family, including adjunct faculty and other staff members.

In the course of these conversations, I have been struck by how many people are surprised that food insecurity is an issue that some employees on this campus have to contend with. Yes, ECC is a wonderful place to work and there are benefits to working here, but there is not equal distribution of these benefits, so, yes, there are people who work here and *still* face food insecurity and other insecurities. To think otherwise is naïve and illustrations the privilege that some of us do have.

There seems to be this assumption, this misconception, that all faculty are the same—that we all get paid well, that we all have cushy schedules that give us plenty of free time to attend meetings, workshops, and such, so how could we have so few faculty to participate in some of committees and workshops on campus? However, not all faculty are the same, just as all staff members are not the same. As Dr. Garber mentioned in the Performance Report at the Committee of the Whole meeting, there is even a difference between full-time and part-time students. He reported that full-time students were able to progress through their classes until completion. Part-time students "didn't fare as well." Retention and completion were both lower for part-time students. Dr. Garber said it was more likely that the part-time students had to work to take care of their families.

There is a commonality between our part-time students and our adjunct faculty. Our adjunct faculty, just like our part-time students, are having to work to support their families. Because they often don't make a living wage as an adjunct, they have priorities outside of ECC at other institutions.

When these assumptions I mentioned previously are made and all faculty are put into the same category, then it is easier to ignore the issues that some of our employees face, and adjunct faculty, then, continue to fall between the cracks, and the divide of inequity grows further.

Not recognizing the privileges that some of us have allows these misconceptions to continue. Privilege has a way of blinding us to the realities of those around us, and not recognizing the privileges that some of us have allows these misconceptions to continue, which means food insecurity and other insecurities continue amongst the people who work here. You never know if the person you're sitting next to at a meeting is struggling with the choice of filling up their car with gas in order to get from job to job or to buy milk for their children.

c. Addendum C: AFT Innovation Mini-Grant

The AFT Innovation Fund is pleased to announce that we have expanded and updated this school year's mini-grants in alignment with the AFT's <u>What Kids and Communities Need</u> campaign. These grants are about getting "back to the basics" by directly investing in the kinds of classroom initiatives, educator supports and school-based enrichment programs that help kids and communities succeed in the long term. We invite local and state K-12, PSRP and higher education members, with support from their affiliate president, to <u>submit applications</u> that focus on <u>educator retention</u>, <u>career and technical education</u>, <u>community schools initiatives</u> and <u>literacy proposals</u>.

Grant awards will range from \$20,000 to \$50,000 (with consideration given to affiliate size).

Below, we offer some guidance on the ways we can support these priorities:

Educator Retention:

- Restructuring schools to create positive working and learning conditions for all;
- Giving educators the time, tools, trust and training to succeed; and
- Providing sustainable and commensurate compensation and benefits as well as strengthening collective bargaining processes and agreements.

Career and Technical Education:

- Creating new and expanded links to high schools and local community colleges;
- Ensuring strong engagement of employees;
- Emphasizing credentials and credits that can increase student momentum to either community college or employment in a good job; and
- Committing to equitable access and progress in CTE for students from traditionally underserved populations.

Community Schools:

- Creating school-based enrichment programs;
- Developing strategies for students with special needs; and
- Creating a safe and welcoming environment for students and educators.

Literacy:

Developing strategies and programs to boost literacy instruction and professional development.
